Important Dates

I. Airport Pick-Up

UNB Saint John: Airport pick-up service is available from **August 27 to September 3**. Students must register: http://www.unbsj.ca/international/services/pickup.php. (This service is not available for students arriving outside of these dates; however, there are telephones with direct lines to taxis in the airport.)

UNB Fredericton: There aren't any shuttles from the airport to the city, but there is a taxi service (approximately \$25). If a taxi is not waiting outside the door, there are designated telephones with a direct line to a taxi inside the airport.

II. Fall Classes

Saint John College: Support Program will commence September 4, 2008; *EAP Program will commence September 2, 2008. English Placement Testing schedule is as follows:

UNB Saint John Signs Agreement to Establish Medical Training Facility

After much hard work between the government of New Brunswick, Dalhousie University and the University of New Brunswick, an agreement has been reached that will develop a new medical training program in Saint John, as well as provide new opportunities for Saint John College. Everything is in gear to have Dalhousie University start its four-year undergraduate medical program in Saint John, NB, starting in September 2010. This will complement a Université de Sherbrooke French-language medical training program already in place at the Université de Moncton. The current Saint John College building will be renovated to become the new permanent home for the **Dalhousie New Brunswick Medical Program**. The proximity of Saint John College to the Regional Hospital is going to fit like a glove in the new training complex. As for Saint John College, it will continue to provide the exceptional services it currently provides, both on campus and in an expanded role in Saint John's Uptown core. II. Students Who Apply to Select Programs at the Fredericton Campus Will Now Be Considered for Conditional Admission

Students who are offered a conditional acceptance will be assessed on their English language skills when they arrive on campus. Based on the results of the English Language Placement test, students will be placed either in an Academic English Program or will be able to enroll in regular university courses.
